Here is a troy of the motion parsed at the National Convention on June 17th, 1970 concerning dues:

- l) Each state fiddlers association that wishes to belong to the National Oldtime Fiddlers Association shall pay 50¢ for each resident member of record. This entitles each State member to a Notional Oldtime Fiddlers Association membership card.
- 2) Any member of a state affiliated with the National may pay \$1.00 additional to the State which will be forwarded to the National for the lational Newsletter and Pational notices.
- 3) Any individual living in a state or province which does not belong to the Mational may join the Mational by paying a direct \$5.00 fee to the Mational Oltime Fiddlers Association Secretary (At this time: Joyce Bonar, N. 820 Mavalli Drive, Veradale, Washington, 99037).
