The Oregon Oldtime Fiddlers' Contest will be in Lebanon, Oregon, May 10 and 11th at the South Lebanon High School. There will be RV parking space but no hookups. There will be a place to jam and register AFTER approximately 4:00 p.m. Friday afternoon at the school. Please do NOT go to the school before that time, as school will be in session and parking lots will be occupied. If you arrive before that time, please park along the street away from the school until either Buck Milligan or Lee Jones receives clearance to park. Bring finger foods for Friday evening. The contest for Seniors will start at 7:00 p.m.

There will be no practicing or jamming in the Registration Room. Other rooms will be available for this. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CONTESTANT TO BE AT THE STAGE ENTRANCE, READY TO PLAY, WHEN HIS OR HER TURN COMES. STATE RULES will prevail as interpreted by contest officials. Each contestant must play a Hoedown, a Waltz, and a selection of their choice other than a hoedown or waltz. Novelty tunes, such as Orange Blossom Special, Listen to the Mockingbird or Black Mountain Rag will not be permitted. No cross-tuning on stage. All tunes must be of danceable quality. A time of four minutes will be allowed for your performance All accompanists must be registered and pay a \$3.00 fee. Out of state accompanists may be used, but will not be eligible for awards. State rules require residence in Oregon for six months and Association membership for six months. Judges are as follows: Jim Hoots - Oregon, Millie Barron - B.C. Canada, Vivian Williams - Washington, Jess Cooper - Oregon and Shelly Johnson - California. There will be a meeting of all fiddlers and jusges prior to the contest Friday evening and Saturday morning. Good luck and HAVE FUN!!!




DISTRICT 7
