REPORT FROM THE DIRECTOR OF OUR SUMMER SHOWS:

At the time of this report, Aug. 20, we have completed all of our Summer Shows for which we get paid except the LINN COUNTY FAIR, which will be held in Albany Sept. 19. See Calendar of coming events for details about that show. We have staged a total of nine shows, including two each in Corvallis and Canby, for which we have received a total of \$2000.00. The Linn County Show will add another \$250.00 to our treasury.

The people who cared enough about our organization to drive many miles at their own expense to share their talents in these shows on behalf of all of us deserve all the praise and credit we can heap upon them. Unfortunately, with the exception of Dee Johnson, who came to play at Canby, none of our champions showed up. This is unfortunate for two reasons: first, when our best players don't appear we are obviously not putting on a show that is truly indicative of what we're capable of. Of course we're an organization of amateurs; everyone knows that; but the fact is, several of our "cream of the crop" are as good as any professional, and if only one or two of these were to appear at each of our shows it would raise the general level of quality a great deal. The other reason it's unfortunate is that it is written right into our State Contest Rules that a champion fiddler will be expected to represent our organization whenever and wherever possible; therefore any champion, or future champion, ideally should feel a moral obligation to appear at at least one of these shows each year.

Money for operating expenses to run our organization has to come from somewhere. These shows have been bringing in from \$1500 to \$2000 dollars into our treasury for many years. I'm not the only one who thinks that we may be in danger of losing some of this income if the quality of our shows for pay is not improved. We can improve, and I think we must improve.

Some of our shows this year were put on under extremely adverse conditions. In Corvallis, for example, we played in the largest Sauna in the state of Oregon. Officially it was called the ARENA, but with the temperature hovering around 100 or more it was actually just one gigantic hotbox!

David Boyd put it aptly when he said, "If they give medals in the O.O.T.F.A. for service above and beyond the call of duty, the people who came here Friday and Saturday certainly deserve them!" He was so right!

I wish I could list the names of all the wonderful, marvellous people who participated in these shows, because they deserve more praise and credit than we can possibly give them. Knowing that it's inadequate, I still want to say to all of them, on behalf of the entire organization, MANY, MANY THANKS!!

#### CANYONVILLE CONTEST:

We had a fine day for our contest. The weather was in the 80's and the big exhaust fan that the fiddlers donated two years ago kept the gym very comfortable.

We had 28 entries with a few new faces of fiddlers who were in Canyonville for the first time. So with 10 in the Senior, 11 in the Intermediate, and 7 in the Open, the competition was good in those divisions.

The sad note was that there were NO entries in the Junior-Junior and Junior divisions. This was especially discouraging since this was supposed to mark the first time the HANK WOBBE MEMORIAL TROPHY was to be presented to the 1st place Junior-Junior winner. The family of Hank Wobbe (District #4) has established this fund and proposes to award this memorial trophy each year at the Canyonville Contest. Hank always came to the Canyonville Contest. He was a great person and we all miss him. I can think of no better way to honor him so was much disappointed that there were no youngsters here. After all, the goal of our organization is to perpetuate the music through our young people. And a small contest like Canyonville is a good place to start.

Another problem we had was poor attendance. We only had 50 paid admissions in the afternoon and 71 in the evening. This is the worst it has ever been. There are several factors: So many people remember how hot the gym used to be. And, folks, you would not believe how much difference the big fan makes! Another is publicity. I will have to work on that next year. I have been depending on the Pioneer Days Committee for that and it wasn't that well done. You folks will have to help me in that department. We want to continue the contest but we must have more paid tickets in order to survive. The merchants of Canyonville are real supportive. The same ones donate trophies every year. Thirty trophies from this small town is a lot, especially since there are so many other Pioneer Days events they donate plaques, ribbons, and trophies for. The fiddlers are supportive. It is the listeners we need.

I welcome any ideas and help. Surely something can be done to put this contest in the black. There has to be or it will go down the tube and after 20 years that would certainly be a shame.

# WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Any of you who play an instrument or sing know how busy and complicated our schedules can be with the many places to perform. Most of you perform in our large group jams and other functions, and, again, as members of small groups, or alone. There has been some discussion and confusion concerning identification, recognition and compensation for these various activities.

Any time you perform under the title of Oregon Old Time Fiddler you are a representative of the organization and monies earned go either to the state, if it is a state function, or to your local district treasury. This has been explicitly delineated in our state By-Laws and there should be no question about it. However, many places also choose to feed the performers and their spouses as extra appreciation for the music.

There are members, also, who are known otherwise, by personal name, or as a member of a small named group, who are asked to perform. We have MANY small groups throughout the state made up solely or partially of fiddler members. . If this is how you were CONTACTED and ADVERTISED or BILLED, your compensation is your own personal affair and has nothing to do with the fiddlers' association. With the exception of one group of VISITORS in one district, and listed as such, these other named groups are NOT LISTED in any district news. We could fill several pages of the Hoedowner by just listing the activities of the several NAMED small groups just around the Willamette Valley area, but this would not be appropriate or proper. It is just like wearing two different hats, or sometimes three. When you play, remember your title billing determines who gets the compensation and who gets Hoedowner recognition from your district. If you play under another name, please do your own advertising. Just try to remember which hat you are wearing each time you play, and there should be no further confusion. Remember there are MANY small groups in each district, and when they are listed in district news "in general" they ARE playing as Oregon Old Time Fiddlers and we just do not have space to list all the names of the players. Besides, I feel it is more important to let people know how busy WE are than to always know just exactly WHO we are. are all in this boat together, and it takes us all to make it float. don't punch holes in the hull if someone goes fishing in another boat once in awhile. Just keep on rowing together!

Shortly after that, he was hospitalized a second time with another ruptured artery and has had two surgeries since you heard last. June has practically "camped" out at the hospital to be near him. The latest report is that he has improved some and we are more encouraged with his progress this week. He still has a long way to go, yet.


