

Yachats Smelt Fry and follow up: For those of you not familiar with smelt, they are a little silvery fish about six inches long that come to the beach (and up the rivers) to spawn. (The ladies were in the community for their brother's funeral.) There wasn't a dry eye in that little group sitting on the porch. It only serves to remind me that you don't have to play in Carnegie Hall or in Nashville to bring pleasure to people. I just imagine as the ladies return to California and Montana the following week that this story will be told again and again "about the fiddle music they heard just like Dad and Howard use to play." Sometimes just playing our fiddles on a warm afternoon on the front porch for three people brings back many memories and adds to the joy of the moment.


