

Tales of Travel and New Friends by Jeannette Bondsteel

Having grown up in Alaska, it would be natural for me to want to return home to visit every so often. This time it was 40 years since the last time I had been to Alaska and I was feeling the tug of going home. The best time to go home for me is in March when the Fur Rendezvous is taking place, dog mushers are primed to set off on the 1000 mile Iditarod Trail, Native Alaskan families have come to Anchorage from the outer villages to trade their crafts. Games of strength, stealth and stamina like blanket tossing, snowshoe baseball and dog sled challenges are played. The weather gave us subzero temperatures, heavy snow fall and a total count of 11 moose sighted.

Traveling to Alaska this March with my BFF and fiddle friend Marlene Stevens was the best. Out plan was to play our fiddles everywhere we could while on this trip. We played in the airports as we awaited each of our flights; much

to the appreciation of the flight crews and other passengers. We even had people taking videos of us and thanking us for the music.

After taking in a few days of the Fur Rendezvous activities and watching the kickoff of the Iditarod Racers we headed down the Kenai Peninsula. The next stop for us was to Anchor Point overlooking the Cook Inlet – the farthest point west on the Northern Continent that we could drive. What a feeling of being small in this world or that the world has so much yet to be seen.

We traveled on to Homer which is the farthest tip of the Kenai Peninsula and the home of the Salty Dawg Saloon and the Kilcher Family Homestead. Yes, we played our fiddles in the Salty Dawg Saloon and left a \$1 bill pinned to the wall amongst thousands of others with *Oregon Old Time Fiddlers* written on it. And yes, we found the Kilcher's Homestead out on East End Road.

While walking the streets of Anchorage at the Fur Rendezvous we bumped into a friend that owns Kenai Joes Tap House in Kenai. When he heard we play music he talked us into playing at his bar the following Friday. We tenuously accepted the offer or challenge as we saw it. Joe arranged for the local high school music teacher to back us up on guitar and we fiddled on stage for 3 hours. The locals loved it and we felt good about bringing something new and different to their stage; the \$57 in tips didn't hurt either. Does this make us professional musicians?

Our biggest news for the month is that we finally signed an agreement with the Powell Butte Christian Church to have our monthly jams again. ASAP following the reopening of Oregon, we will be announcing our first jam at the new location: 13720 OR-126, Powell Butte, OR 97753. We are expecting this location to host many great jams as well as see an increase of attendance as the church members join us after services.

This coming month we will be saying good by to one of our young men. Garitt Bondsteel will be heading for the Marines in May. We are gong to miss him and look forward to seeing his return. A huge thank you goes out to all the OOTFA folks that have played a role in making him the wonderful young man he is today - Jack Kerr, Roland White, Les Tucker, Ed Fritz, Ron and Sally Jackson, Larry and Terry McLane, Ellen and our late Dennis Jakab, Jeff and Marlene Stevens. 


