

I was born on a hot Sunday. It was about five minutes after noon on the 21st day of August in 1927. The place was the little town in the Ozarks of Missouri named Ava. There were already two sisters, aged two and four. Mom was 22 and Dad was 28.

About the time I was six, my mother and her younger sister started teaching my sisters and I to sing. After a few simple songs and ditties they began to add three part harmony, rounds and songs where we each took a turn with a part. Being too young to read we committed all of the teaching to memory. I have continued to do that all my life.

Each school that I attended, from the first grade through high school, had music classes and instruction. Music had become a passion of mine by the time I was in fourth grade. As I progressed through school the music began to broaden in scope. In high school, Glee Club, Boys' Quartet, Ensembles, and solo were included. I still couldn't read music and never applied myself to learn.

When my 17th birthday arrived I became an enrollee in the Merchant Marine Academy. Low and behold! At the training facility on Catalina Island they had a 130 voice choir. I was accepted as a bass. What a thrill that was! We had a radio broadcast via KFI Los Angeles each Friday evening.

Participating in musical activities has been a central part of my life. You could say it has been a vital lifeline for me as I am sure it has been to most of you with whom I share this wonderful part of my life. Through the years I have added some instruments to my vocals but purely at scratch level; not an artist as so many of you who have worked so hard to become.

Joining, being with and serving with the Oregon Oldtime Fiddlers' Association and all of you whom I have come to love and appreciate so much has been the keystone to my life's musical arch. Keep on fiddlin'!

I recently became the proud owner of a first edition of the Hoedowner! It was given me by my dear friend, Dottie Birkett. The first edition, issued on March 14, 1967, 54 years ago, was a one page issue printed on gold, 11 by 17 inch paper. The heading states, "First Edition Hoedowner", and on

one side of this is a guy playing a bass fiddle and on the other side a lady playing a guitar. Under the heading, down the cen-



ter of the page, is an illustration with the prose composition on either side. The sketch is a ranch scene at the top and a fence down the center with a horse on either side. On one side a cowboy is bowing his fiddle furiously, on the other a cowboy with a guitar is being startled by a rattlesnake at his feet while a coyote howls in the distance and two prairie dogs dance with delight. The bottom of the page declares in bold letters, OLDTIME FIDDLERS ASSOCIA-**TION**, and includes the officers names. I was impressed with this extraordinary report and could imagine a member receiving this in the mail and being totally receptive to the



idea of having this come to them monthly and at the same time wondering what their officers are up to now?

The article is written by Cliff Buker, the then President of OOTFA, and the first editor of the

Hoedowner. In his message he writes "I'm going to name a group of members who I want to head a committee in your area and get all the help you can get and get together now and then for a little jam session, then write to me about the activities. "That was the beginning of our Hoedowner which has been faithfully compiled and issued for 54 years. Seventeen editors and numerous reporters over the years have put pencil to paper or fingers to keyboards to write of the activities and accomplishments of their district and to keep the members around the state informed. If Cliff Buker could only see today what his idea has become. The little one page issue has become a multi-page publication of prose, photos, tunes of the month, news of past and future events. I'm sure he would be so pleased with what that little committee he started 54 years ago has become today.

An Incompleat Historie of Ye Olde Tyme American Musik, Part 2

The African-American influence in Oldtime Appalachian Music

Early in the settling of America, the Scots-Irish immigrants were obviously the major influences on early **Oldtime Music**. The jigs, reels, and other pieces they brought with them, and hence adapted, form the base of most **Appalachian Music**.

One thing cannot be overstated: no other group made greater contributions to this most American form of music than **African-Americans**. Fiddling "was pervasive

for entertainment at family and other social gatherings in many African American communities between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries..." (4)

It has been estimated that, at the time of the Revolutionary War, over half of the fiddle players in the South were African-American (1). It has also been well-documented that these fiddlers played for European-Americans as well as other audiences.

"Among the early famous fiddlers for which there remains historical verification, is **Sy Gilliat** who was

regularly employed by the Governor's Palace in Williamsburg and was the most popular fiddler in Richmond, Virginia for almost two generations. The city's newspaper published the following notice at the time of his death in 1820: ... a man of color, very celebrated as a Fiddler, and much caressed by polished society who will long deplore the loss.... In 1856 in his book "Richmond in By-Gone Days", historian **Samuel Mordecai** describes Gilliat as... (the) most prominent member of the black aristocracy." (3)

The impact of folks like Sy was that the music became "more syncopated, improvisational, bluesy, [with more] rhythmic styles, with, ultimately a lasting impact on Appalachian fiddle playing."

A STORY ABOUT A HYMN by Melody Morrell

Southeast of Corvallis, at the intersection of Church and Oakville Roads, stands the old Oakville Church. The original congregation was formed in 1850, holding service in a log cabin. In 1860 a new church was built. Now known as Oakville Willamette United Presbyterian Church, it represents the oldest hymn singing congregation in the

West still in existence. One can imagine 160 years of joyful weddings and sorrowful processions in the **Oakville Cemetery** just up the road.

In early May of 1995, out of the blue, an old hymn popped into my head; "Is My Name Written There?" I was puzzled because I didn't know where I had heard it. The song was not in the hymnal from the church of my youth, nor was it in the two older hymnals I had. But I remembered the first line of the first verse, the chorus and the entire tune.

About two weeks later I was leading a group of ladies on a **Willamalane Parks & Rec.** bicycle ride that included a stop at the Oakville Church. The door was unlocked and we entered. In the foyer stood a small table upon which rested a hymnal. Impulsively I picked it up and opened it to a page at random. I was astonished to see before me the old hymn! I looked at the piano at the front of the sanctuary and thought, "do I dare?" Yes! I went to the piano and played the hymn. I wondered if the sound would be heard at the parsonage across the parking lot and someone would come to investigate.

Fast forward to 2017. After deciding to endure the complexities of going north to be in the path of the totality of the solar eclipse and considering and rejecting several locations, I remembered the old Oakville Church. Bob and I passed crowds along Peoria Road and I thought if the church lot was full we could try the cemetery instead. We overshot Church Road and looped back to Oakville. I was surprised to see no one at the cemetery (no one above ground, that is). There was a small party at the parsonage.

After the celestial show our little group was approached by a parishioner who told us the church was unlocked and we were welcome to use the restrooms. I entered the sanctuary. On the front pew I saw a hymnal and sat down to look at it. A scan of the index showed that at some point the church had replaced the old hymnals

with new ones. The old hymn was gone.

Happy Note 1: I related this story to my sister and at the next gift giving occasion she resented me with an old hymnal with a bookmark in it. The lost hymn was no longer lost.

Happy Note 2: To find the date of my Oakville bike ride I was faced with a file with dozens of pages of ride schedules. I opened the file at random and there was "Spring 1995" with the Oakville

First published in 1921, it is one of many popular songs whose lyrics use a "Bluebird of happiness" as a symbol of cheer. ("So keep on looking for a bluebird, and listening for his song.") In 2014, the song was later remastered by Pierre Karana, he is also attributed to remixing the lyrics.

The song was introduced in the 1921 Broadway musical Bombo, where it was performed by Al Jolson. It became a well-known Jolson standard: the first of his several recordings of the song was on Columbia Records in October 1921. It has also been recorded by many other artists. (Wikipedia)

I asked her about Paul (who almost always came with her when she went to a jam) and she said, "Oh, he is outside chopping wood which he enjoys doing." A Truely Beautiful Soul

Our wonderful District 8 Lifetime Member, Fred Hardin, passed away on February 27, 2021. He was a terrific fiddler and singer and was a very important figure at the many OOTFA Conventions held in Rickreall over the years, serving as Master of Ceremonies each year. He was born

in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, to **Arthur** and **Daisy** (**Steidley**) **Hardin**, Fred was the 8th child of 9 and grew up during the depression. His elementary, junior high, and high school years were spent in Claremore, Oklahoma, where he met his future wife, **Charlotte Hill**, in the 5th grade, and they grew up together. They married right out of high school and were blissfully and happily married for over 65 years. Charlotte passed away on October 8, 2012.

Fred was a mission pastor of several Baptist Churches in Oklahoma before becoming a 5th and 6th grade teacher after attending **Tulsa University**. He and Charlotte moved to Pedee, Oregon in 1956. He taught several years before becoming interested in real estate, land development and home construction. He built 140 homes in Dallas and West Salem.

Dennis always wanted to be a cowboy. The role models of his youth (Roy Rogers and Gene Autry) had guitars and sang. So, of course, that's what he wanted to do, too.

As a teenager he bought a \$5 guitar and \$3 book and taught himself to play. He remembers "On Top of Old Smokey" as the first song he played. For the next 40 years he played his guitar and sang by himself for the pure joy of doing it. When pickstrawberries ing and singing, someone remarked "Hey, you're pretty good." Others who came upon him happily singing country music began comment, as well. He remembers at a bar, a friend urged him to sing. He was

too shy. Finally, though, as the glasses lined up on the counter, he sang a song. And people liked it.

Dennis has been a farmer all his life. He loves the challenge and fun of growing cherries. He actively works on methods to improve yield and quality of the fruit and has been on the **Oregon Sweet Cherry Commission**.

In the early 1990s Dennis was asked by the McMinnville Grange if he could form a band to play there. He did, and it became The Country Gents. They've been playing Friday nights at the Grange for 25 years. Around this time, Dennis met Lew Holt, who suggested he join OOTFA. Dennis characterized himself as a country and western singer, not a fiddler. Lew told him that was exactly what they needed, and if Dennis wanted to play with the group, he'd have to become a member. So, Dennis joined OOTFA. He always looked forward to the Sunday jams and good times playing with others. He quickly became a mainstay of District 8 and served twice as chairman.

When Dennis struggled with timing, he found **Donna Oldham** and **Norm McGrew** willing and easy to learn from. **Wally Moon** also helped Dennis hone his skills and became a mentor. "Wally was an excellent musician. It made me feel like a million dollars just to get to play with him."

In the late 1990s Dennis joined a local group of musicians, **The Mavericks**, that played every Wednesday at rest homes and senior centers.

Dennis always manages to get the fiddlers involved in his music. **Marie Bailey** recalls that before she knew how to back-up or fill-in, he passed the lead to her. Apart from the surprise of it, when she faltered, he sang the melody to her and encouraged her to pick it up by ear. The audience loved it because he wouldn't let her back out easily, and the fiddler learned how the lead can pass around in a band.

Dennis has a penchant for funny, rhyming, tongue-twisting ditties that make you laugh out loud, and he loves every minute of it.

If he catches you enjoying his music, his eyes sparkle just a little bit more and he graces you with one of his country-boy smiles. Music makes him happy, and it shows. **Dennis is a cherry-picking, guitar-pickin', country-singing cowboy.**
