

For the final installment of a Very Short, and Incomplete, History of Old Time Fiddling, we'll take a peek at three very influential traditional styles: Cajun, Zydeco, and Texas. Note that, in this instance, "Texas fiddling" means early East Texas, and not Texas Swing, which evolved later and was a huge influence on both Country and Western, Bluegrass, and other styles of music.

Zydeco and Cajun (sometimes referred to as Louisiana-style) trace their beginnings to the founding of New Orleans, in 1718. The influx of French-Canadi-

an Arcadian, Spanish, French, and Haitian immigrants all contributed to a culture which most refer to as Creole (quite distinct from other Southern cultures. which naturally led to distinct forms of music). Early East Texas fiddling, influenced by Cajun, Appalachian, and Mexican music, evolved into what is often referred to as "contest style," due to its influence on today's fiddling contests.

Cajun, Zydeco, and Texas styles, though differing from each other, are distinguishable from other styles by their sometimes unusual timing, phrasing, and a rather more liberal use of double-stops, drone strings, and more "slides," or glissandos. All three styles were also influenced by the blues.

Perhaps the best-known of modern Cajun fiddlers is Doug Kershaw, who has been playing the fiddle since 1948. You can see Doug playing his most well-known song, "Louisiana Man," live on YouTube.

"Jambalaya" is an original Cajun tune, popularized by Hank Williams and recorded by dozens of artists (Note I said "popularized" since many believe he probably purchased the song – with the lyrics -- from another musician. This was a very common practice).

For some East Texas fiddling, here is Kevin Martin playing "Babe."

2: You must wear a face mask (feel free to be festive with that face wear).


We hope to see you there!!! NOTE: This is not an official OOTFA event!

I started playing classical guitar when I was 13 years old. Gave that up quickly and drifted into folk music in the 60's. I learned to play the banjo and played with several groups before the reality of working and going to medical school set in. I lived in Chicago, Minneapolis and Salt Lake before moving to Eugene in 1986 to start a new company here. All of my instruments lay stored in their cases until 1992. I built a vacation home in Florence and started playing again. In 2000 I moved to Florence permanently and joined OOTFA that year when



I heard a group playing in Florence in front of the Emporium. Just happened to have my banjo in the car. Asked if I could join them. The rest is history! We would practice at the high school once a week and then play in Coos Bay with the fiddlers once a month.

In 2003 I became involved with the **Florence Winter Folk Festival** and produced that for 13 years, with many great folk and oldtime musicians performing over the years. I was invited to England in 2004 to teach an oldtime banjo class at a folk festival in Sidmouth. That reenergized my love of playing oldtime music. In 2005 I

shared the chairmanship of **District 5** with **Larry Gallagher**. The same year I started the **New Folksters** with several OOTFA members. In 2008-2009 I served as OOTFA president again from 2009-2012. I want to thank all of those who have volunteered as officers for the organization.

I restarted the New Folksters in 2015 when I moved back to Eugene. The new group had **Beverly Schriver, Keith Barr** and sometimes **Ken Luse**. We played all over the NW and SW. I guess I am stuck in the **Great Folk Scare** of the 60s. Old folks like me never die.

Like many others I can't wait to play with people in person again. Jamming on Zoom is not the same thing. Also, I have lost most of my callouses and need to start playing again!

Singer, Songwriter & Versatile Musician Johnnie Williams By Joyce Orsini


Raised on a farm in Westfir/Oakridge, Oregon, Johnnie Williams began to sing along with a wind-up Victrola at age 6. He copied the country music superstars, practicing until he sounded exactly like them. Roy Acuff and Hank Williams had an early influence on his style. Acuff's "Great Speckled Bird" stands out in his memory.

Johnnie remembers a neighbor telling his stepmom "that kid can really sing." With that encouragement, Johnnie entered many talent contests and usually came in first or second. Whenever there was an operetta, play, or show at Cottage Grove High School, he was called upon to be "the singer" every time.

Johnnie's high school music teacher had been a recent graduate of the University of Oregon, and also coached the choir there. When this teacher brought the UO choir to Johnnie's high school for a major performance, he convinced Johnnie to sing a solo, a major achievement and honor. This same teacher recommended that Johnnie apply for a scholarship to UO in his senior year. But, Johnnie's family moved to Arizona. His biggest challenge after that was to learn the guitar on his own.

While in Arizona, he had jam sessions with a group that included **Waylon Jennings**. When Waylon went east to Nashville, Johnnie came west, back to Oregon.

Beginning in 1965 Johnnie became a professional musician, forming several country bands that performed all over the

Seattle-Tacoma region. He took a hiatus in 1982 and moved to Dallas to work at Praegizer/Tyco as circuit board in spection operator and trainer.

In 2002 Johnnie came back to music, had business cards printed up and

became a professional musician listed on ReverbNation as Johnnie's Country. This time it was all solo performances. All types of music, all types of venues. You name it, he played it.



He expanded from guitar to fiddle, harmonica, ukulele, and bass guitar. Johnnie has a song repertoire that numbers in the hundreds and includes just about every country song you've ever heard. He has written several songs, also; all express communal feelings with tender simplicity.

A versatile musician, Johnnie developed his own style of guitar playing that integrates bass strings, lead guitar, and rhythm, giving a rich depth to his music. This talent comes in handy when there are just a few players in a group, too. He can fill in for whatever sound is missing. Through his harmonica he adds tone, color, and interest to the songs.

Soon after returning to Oregon, Johnnie met **Dennis Brutke**, who invited him to sing a couple of numbers, and then convinced him to join **District 8** of **OOTFA**, where he is now Vice President and a lifetime member, singing, playing, and harmonizing. He also joined the **Mavericks** country music band with Dennis. **Marie Bailey** was a member at that time, also. He remembers playing at Vineyard Heights, and so many other places.

When Johnnie performs with a group, he enjoys when each person has a chance to sing or play a verse and pass it along. And whenever he's on call to play, he likes to do something special with it.

Johnnie has taken up bowling. A wall filled with 22 trophies earned over the past 13 years attests to his prowess. He is particularly proud to have been named the Men's Senior Division Major League Champion of the Walnut City 2010 League Championship Tournament.
